





#### **Examples of expected achievements**

- To enhance the competitiveness of the agri-sector and sustainable forestry, support will be granted to around 10 % of agricultural holdings for investments in restructuring or modernization.
- Restoring, preserving and enhancing ecosystems related to agriculture and forestry is the main priority for the RDP and 27 % of
  agricultural land will be placed under management contracts for supporting biodiversity, improving water management and
  preventing soil erosion.
- In parallel, 2.5 % of the agricultural and forest land will be covered by management contracts to foster carbon sequestration and conservation.
- LEADER Local Development Strategies (LDS) will cover the 96 % of the territory while the 85 % should benefit from improved services and infrastructures in view of promoting social inclusion and local development in rural areas.


### **Examples of key challenges**

- A key challenge for the 1 300 agricultural holdings which have an average size of 59 ha is to improve their economic and environmental performance.
- With 52 % of the UAA covered by permanent grassland and the remaining 48 % by arable land, main environmental challenges for the region relate to soil erosion and abandonment, pressure on biodiversity and pollution of surface and ground waters.
- Rural areas in Saarland are affected by demographic change and loss of business activities. The unemployment rate in line with
  national average is 6.4%. In this context major challenges are the creation of opportunities for the development of businesses,
  local development and improvement of infrastructures.





### 3. Planned expenditure per priority



## 5. Choice of measures by priority and focus areas

The following chart shows which priorities and focus areas are selected in the RDP and the combination of measures used to address them. For each measure the budget breakdown per focus area is given. Priority 1 is considered to be cross-cutting and no separate financial allocation is shown as the expenditure is distributed across other focus areas. Expenditure under Priority 4 is programmed for the priority as a whole, not for individual focus areas.
