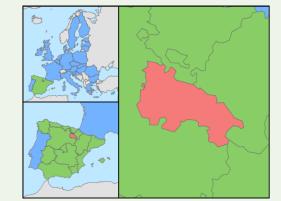

#### **Examples of expected achievements**

- The region aims at enhancing the viability of farming and forestry in the region and it will give investment support to modernise and restructure around 18 % of the farms in La Rioja.
- About 4 % of farms will receive start up aid for young farmers to launch their businesses.
- · Almost 13 000 places in training courses will be made available and 30 cooperation projects will receive support.
- La Rioja's RDP also promotes conservation and protection of the environment, including more efficient use of resources and
  contribution to climate change reduction. 28 % of irrigated farmland will receive support to improve water efficiency, 38 % of the
  agricultural land will be under management contract to prevent soil erosion and desertification and 36 % to protect biodiversity.
- Local Action Groups (LAGs) under LEADER will develop local initiatives affecting nearly 86 % of the rural population and creating 50 new jobs. 42 % of the population in rural areas will benefit from improved basic services and infrastructures.

#### **Examples of key challenges**

- La Rioja is the least populated region in peninsular Spain (318 647 inhabitants in 2014) and the second smallest in terms of geographical size.
- La Rioja suffers from an ageing population above the national and EU average, as well as from depopulation of less dense settlements. More than three quarters of the municipalities count less than 500 inhabitants.
- · Unemployment rate is 20 %, but almost half of the young people between 15-24 years are unemployed (2013 figures).
- Farming in La Rioja is affected by shortcomings, including their limited physical size (50 % of farms have less than 5 hectares; average farm size is 22.5 hectares), which makes it difficult for farmers to sell their products. Consequently, one of the key challenges for this programming period will be to improve the competitiveness of farms whilst supporting environmentally sustainable agricultural systems and landscapes.

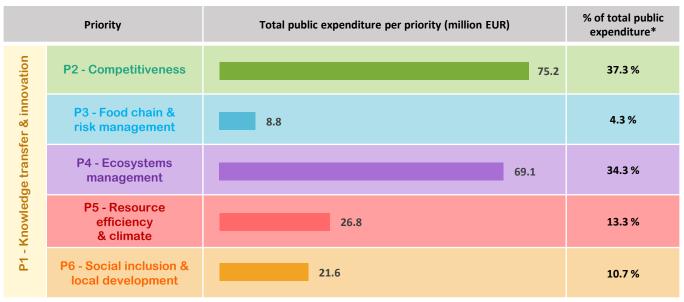

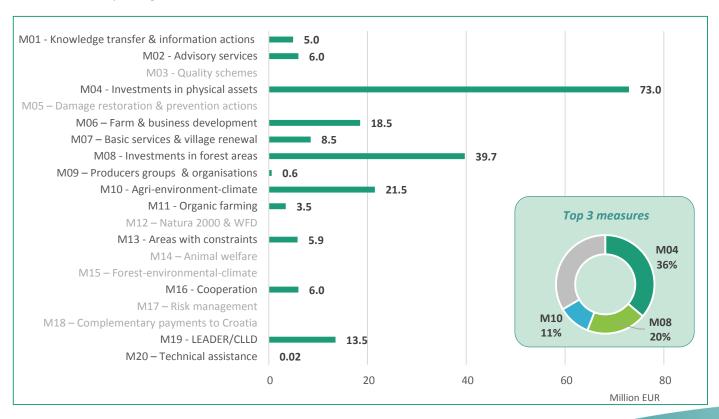
