

Examples of expected achievements

- The RDP will support 100 cooperation projects, including 10 operational groups under the European Innovation Partnership (EIP) on Agricultural Productivity and Sustainability.
- Moreover, to facilitate knowledge transfer through life-long learning, information actions will be realised targeting 900 participants from the agricultural, food and forestry sectors.
- The RDP will support 560 farms (17 % of the total) to improve their economic and environmental performance, and ensure their agricultural competitiveness in the long term.
- The programme will support the installation of 133 young farmers.
- · Small farms are dominant in Martinique and the RDP will provide development assistance for about 260 small farms.
- More than 50 farms will receive support to promote their participation in quality systems and innovative approaches, particularly on marketing methods, including promotion of short chains and local markets.
- Agro-environment-climate measures will cover approximately 2 500 ha (10 % of the total agricultural area).
- About 20 actions will be supported for improving the energy efficiency of farms and primary producers.
- Through LEADER 3 Local Development Strategies will be funded and will cover the whole territory of the island, with the exception of the center of Fort-de-France; and eventually generate 18 jobs.
- Finally, 17 % of the rural population benefit from actions to improve access to high speed internet and broadband.

Examples of key challenges

- · Food industry, the second industry in Martinique, generates more than 36 % of the industrial employment.
- Martinique is characterized by an important diversity of natural environments and richness of species, especially endemic. This exceptional biodiversity is nevertheless fragile due to anthropisation spaces, damages from natural phenomena, etc.
- Concerning the agricultural activity there are issues to be addressed such as soil degradation and soil pollution.
- · Martinique is also highly exposed to climate phenomena such as floods, earthquakes and volcanic activity.













3. Planned expenditure per priority


