#### **Examples of expected achievements**

- With the main emphasis given to enhancing farm viability, promoting innovative farm technologies and the sustainable management of forests it is foreseen that RDP support in terms of investment will reach almost 8 000 farms and support the setting up of almost 5 000 new young farmers.
- Transfer of knowledge will be provided through training of almost 20 000 participants over the period, mainly farmers. The links between the agricultural production sectors and research will be reinforced through 78 cooperation projects.
- Primary producers will be supported by better integrating them into the agri-food chain through quality schemes (around 8 250 farm holdings), adding value to agricultural products, promoting local markets, short supply chains and producer groups.
- Almost 35 % of the agricultural area will be under contracts of Agri-Environment Commitments, Organic Farming or Natura 2000.
- Local Development Strategies (LDS) will be drawn up by the expected 47 Local Action Groups (LAGs). The CLLD/Leader approach will cover almost 73 % of the rural population creating both jobs potentially more than 2 300 new jobs and improving living conditions.


#### **Examples of key challenges**

- About 90 % of the farms in Portugal are considered as small-scale. However these small farms represent 67 % of the UAA and 77 % of the total standard output value. Consequently some of the key challenges will be improving the competitiveness of small farms, promoting better cooperation and concentration.
- In Portugal almost 52 % of the UAA represents High Nature Value farming and 84 % of the UAA is considered of low intensity with almost 58 % dedicated to grazing. Another major challenge will therefore be supporting this type of extensive farming, which is less productive, but highly beneficial for the environment.
- In the field of environment, biodiversity and Natura 2000 areas are a concern for Portugal, taking into account that Natura 2000 represents 21 % of the territory.
- Rural depopulation and increased ageing of the population is a problem and rural regions are more and more facing the negative
  effects of this development.










Focus Area 2B. Entry of skilled/younger farmers






#### Focus Area 5E. Carbon conservation & sequestration



T19 - % of agricultural and forest land under management contracts contributing to carbon sequestration and conservation



## 3. Planned expenditure per priority


