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Involving youth in rural development

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The practice in 3 lines!

- Ask the question: do you want to participate? YES!
- Give real responsibilities, chances and support
- Be the target group

Main purpose - Why?

- Diversity in involvement = better quality of results
- Involvement as a reason to stay or come back
- Myth that young people don't want to participate or live in rural areas
- Difference young/old?
- Younger → More time and choices, less experience and network
- Older → Less time and choices, more experience and network

Stakeholders concerned - Who & how?

- Target group:
 Young people who <u>wants</u> to live in a rural area
- Leading: Youth organisations representing <u>different</u> interests
- Supporting: Combine these with (older) organisations with experience and network
- → Intergenerational meetings = passing on network and experience, supporting young people to develop their own leadership

Lessons

- Difficulties finding youth? Work harder to find them!
- Power dimension Make an effort to speak to those different from you = inclusion
- Listen to and respect everyone as peers
- Avoid alibi one young person does not represent all
- It is easier than we put it complicated models not necessary

Achievements/Results

- Thematic work group for youth in Swedish NRN –
 New members that did not know of the RDP or NRN before participating and contributing
- Learning about rural policies → Teaching about different youths conditions and interests
- Creating competence within our area of interest
- Impact on choices; work, studies, living
- Diversity of participants → better quality → more relevant for a larger group of people → disseminates easier → better rural development and more value for money
